MARKET OVERVIEW

- Credit markets rallied in May as economic data signaled inflation is on a slow and steady path lower, reigniting hope that the Federal Reserve (the “Fed”) will cut interest rates later this year.
- Key economic indicators published throughout May signaled that the resilience of the U.S. consumer is starting to lose steam and inflation is moderating. Gross domestic product rose at a 1.3% annualized pace in the first quarter, below the 1.6% estimate, while personal spending advanced 2% during the first quarter, versus estimates of 2.5%. The core Personal Consumption Expenditures Price Index, which strips out the volatile food and energy components, increased 0.2% in April, the smallest advance of the year. Meanwhile, inflation-adjusted consumer spending unexpectedly fell 0.1% in April as wage growth, the primary driver of demand, moderated. The core Consumer Price Index rose 3.6% year-over-year in May, the smallest increase in three years. Finally, research published in early May by the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco indicated that U.S. households have exhausted their pandemic-era savings.¹
- During the Federal Open Market Committee May meeting, Fed Chair Jerome Powell said that it will take longer to build confidence about the economy’s return to the Fed’s 2% inflation target than previously expected. While Chair Powell ruled out interest rate cuts in the near term, his comments suggest that further rate increases are unlikely.¹
- We continue to see several potential sources of volatility ahead, including upside risks to inflation, further geopolitical tensions, and uncertainty leading into the November U.S. elections. Apollo expects the Fed will likely refrain from cutting interest rates this year, and we anticipate that a higher interest rate environment will persist beyond 2024.
- We believe the current high-rate environment may provide an attractive opportunity for scaled credit providers that can source opportunities across both the private and syndicated markets and we expect our “credit first” philosophy will be on full display as we seek to deliver stable returns through 2024.

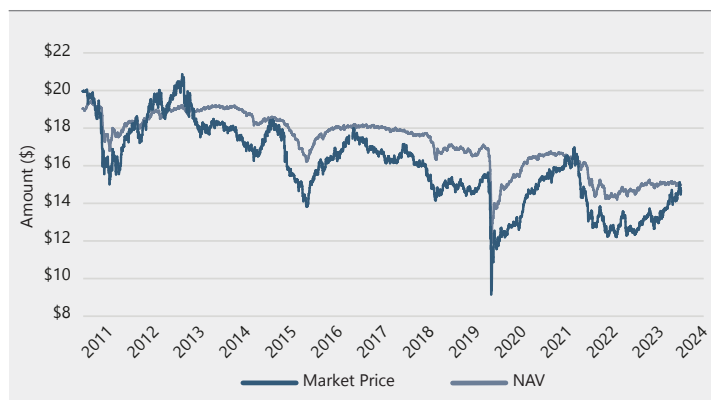

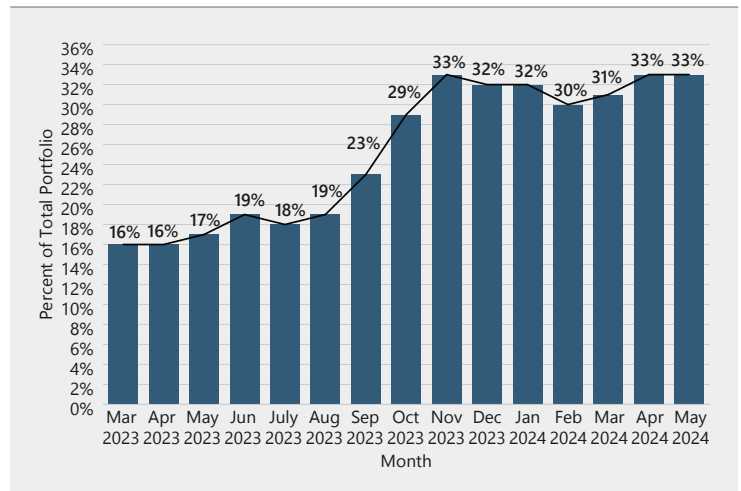

PRIVATE CREDIT OVERVIEW

- According to Preqin, sub-investment grade private credit is a \$1.7 trillion market, surpassing both the syndicated high yield bond and leveraged loan markets.⁹ The rise of private credit over the past 15 years is the result of key structural shifts in the financial ecosystem tied to stricter financial regulation that was implemented following the Global Financial Crisis (“GFC”) in 2008. More recently, the transition from the low-rate environment that characterized most of the post-GFC era to the higher rate environment today has created demand for new financing alternatives. Another recent trend, which may explain the growth of the private market, is what Barclays refers to as the “equification” of credit.¹⁰ The corporate credit market has experienced a similar evolution as the equity market with a move toward electronic trading and exchange-traded funds. Yet, this shift has diminished the extra yield that investors receive for holding bonds that typically trade infrequently. According to Barclays, the liquidity risk premium fell to 5% from as much as 30% a decade ago. We believe this vanishing premium has motivated institutions, such as pension funds and insurance companies, to shift their allocations to private markets.
- In terms of fund raising, direct lending dominated capital raising activity during the first quarter, according to Preqin. Private debt strategies were a favorite destination for allocators, with direct lending funds raising nearly \$25 billion in the first quarter, far surpassing any other strategy.⁹

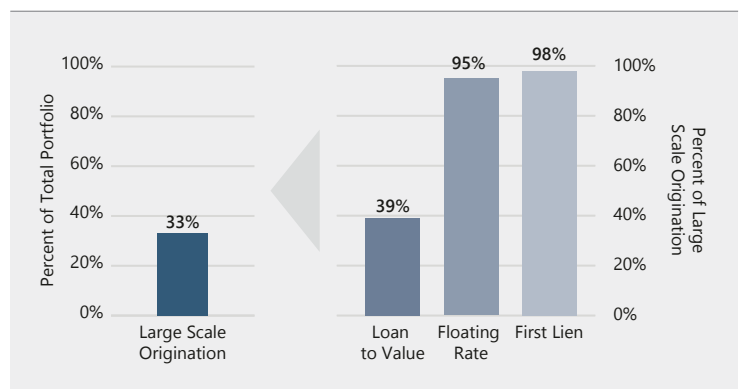

LARGE SCALE ORIENTATION

- This strategy targets large corporate and sponsor-backed issuers utilizing Apollo’s proprietary sourcing channels, primarily focused on first lien, senior secured loans.
- In our view, borrowers will continue to access funding via direct lending as the pressures in the banking sector continue to impact bank lending activity. In an environment with stricter lending standards, combined with existing inflationary pressures, we remained focused on investment at the top of the capital structure and continue to source large cap direct lending opportunities in established businesses with business models that, in our opinion, are more resilient against macroeconomic uncertainty and volatility.

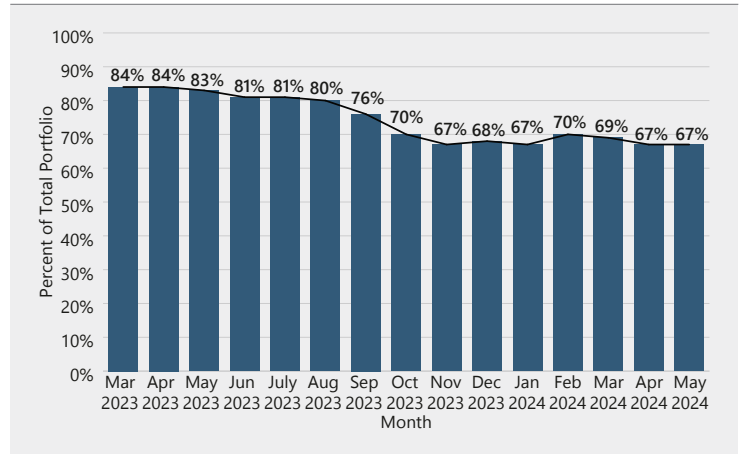

PUBLIC CREDIT OVERVIEW

- Leveraged loans, as represented by the J.P. Morgan Leveraged Loan Index, were up 0.95% in May and leveraged loan yields and spreads decreased 33 bps and 11 bps in May to 8.91% and 461 bps, respectively. The J.P. Morgan Leveraged Loan Index is up 4.28% YTD as of May 31, 2024, with spreads 39 bps lower from the start of the year.¹¹
- High-yield bonds, as represented by the J.P. Morgan High Yield Bond Index, were up 1.18% in May and high-yield bond yields and spreads decreased 13 bps and increased 6 bps in May to 8.14% and 349 bps, respectively. The J.P. Morgan High Yield Bond Index is up 1.93% YTD as of May 31, 2024, with spreads 28 bps lower from the start of the year.¹¹
- As of the end of May, the par weighted U.S. high-yield bond default rate decreased 34 bps month-over-month, to approximately 2.02% and the leveraged loan default rate increased 36 bps month-over-month, to approximately 3.28%.^{11, 12}
- Primary activity in May was a record for leveraged loans and the highest since September 2021 for high-yield bonds. Institutional loan issuance totaled \$159.7 billion (including \$11.5 billion of non-refinancing/repricing) and high-yield bond issuance volume totaled \$33.6 billion (including \$5.8 billion of non-refinancing) in May.¹¹

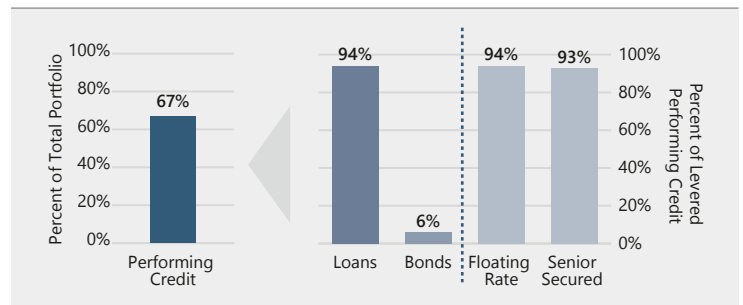

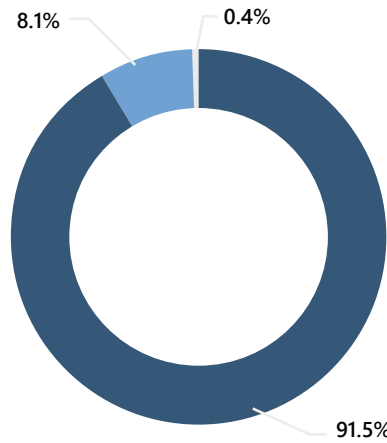

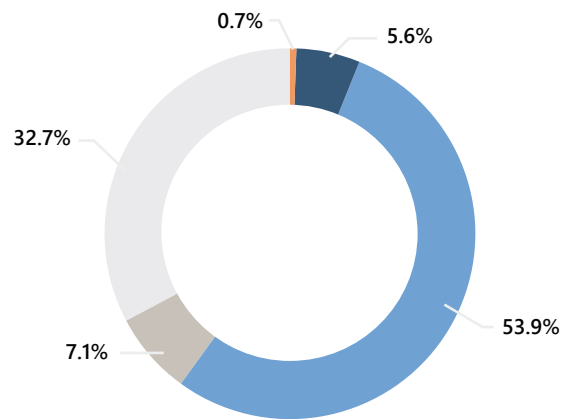

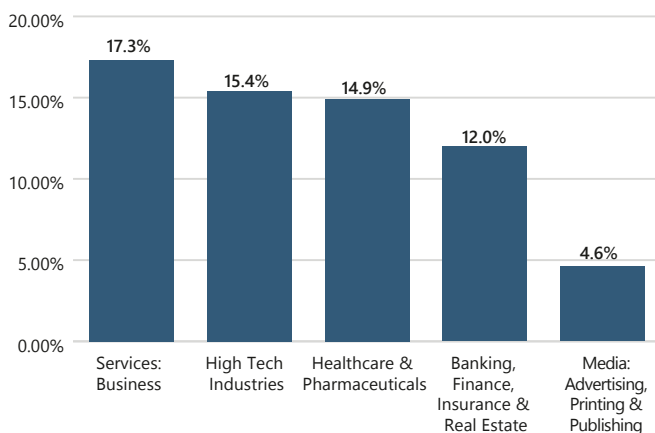

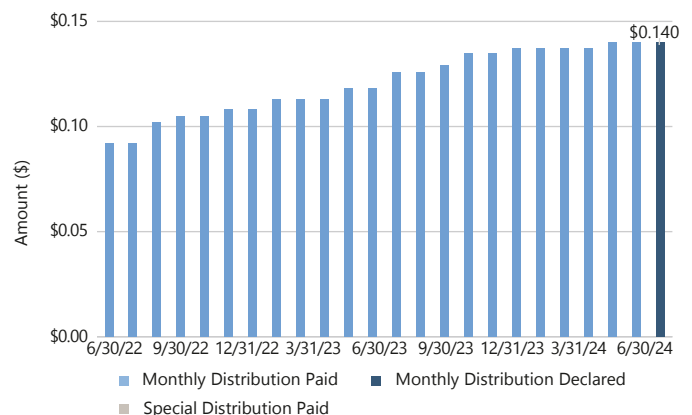

GLOSSARY

Annualized Return: Calculated by annualizing cumulative return (i.e., adjusting it for a period of one year). Annualized return includes capital appreciation and assumes a reinvestment of dividends and distributions.

Attribution: An assessment of the performance of a portfolio or its investments.

Basis Point (bps): A unit of measure used to describe the percentage change. One basis point is equivalent to 0.01% (1/100th of a percent) or 0.0001 in decimal form.

Bond: A debt instrument, also considered a loan, that an investor makes to a corporation, government, federal agency or other organization (known as an issuer) in which the issuer typically agrees to pay the owner the amount of the face value of the bond on a future date, and to pay interest at a specified rate at regular intervals.

Bond Rating: A method of evaluating the quality and safety of a bond. This rating is based on an examination of the issuer's financial strength and the likelihood that it will be able to meet scheduled repayments. Ratings range from AAA (best) to D (worst). Bonds receiving a rating of BB or below are not considered investment grade because of the relative potential for issuer default.

Collateralized Loan Obligation (CLO): A structured credit security backed by a pool of bank loans, structured so there are several classes of bondholders with varying maturities, called tranches. Debt and equity securities of CLOs are sold in tranches where each CLO tranche has a different priority on distributions, unique risk exposures, and yield expectations based on the tranche's place in the capital structure. Distributions begin with the senior debt tranches (CLO debt) and flow down to the equity tranches (CLO equity).

Consumer Price Index (CPI): A price index of a basket of goods and services paid by urban consumers.

Cumulative Return: The compound return of an investment. It includes capital appreciation and assumes a reinvestment of dividends and distributions.

J.P. Morgan High Yield Bond Index: Designed to mirror the investible universe of US dollar high-yield corporate debt market, including domestic and international issues.

J.P. Morgan Leveraged Loan Index: Designed to mirror the investible universe of US Dollar-denominated institutional leveraged loans, including US and international borrowers.

Loan-to-Value (LTV) Ratio: An assessment of lending risk that financial institutions and other lenders examine before lending to a company.

Personal Consumption Expenditures (PCE) Price Index: A measure of the prices that people living in the United States, or those buying on their behalf, pay for goods and services. The PCE price index is known for capturing inflation (or deflation) across a wide range of consumer expenses and reflecting changes in consumer behavior.

S&P/LSTA Leveraged Loan Index (LSTA): A daily total return index that uses mark-to-market pricing to calculate market value change. It tracks, on a real-time basis, the current outstanding balance and spread over LIBOR for fully funded term loans. The facilities included in the LSTA represent a broad cross section of leveraged loans syndicated in the United States, including dollar-denominated loans to overseas issuers.

CERTAIN RISK CONSIDERATIONS

Senior Loans. Senior loans are usually rated below investment grade and may also be unrated. As a result, the risks associated with senior loans are similar to the risks of below investment grade fixed income instruments and may be considered speculative. Corporate Bonds. The Fund may invest in a wide variety of bonds of varying maturities issued by U.S. and foreign corporations, other business entities, governments and municipalities and other issuers. The Fund's investments in corporate bonds may include, but are not limited to, senior, junior, secured and unsecured bonds, notes and other debt securities, and may be fixed rate, variable rate or floating rate, among other things. Apollo expects most of the corporate bonds in which the Fund invests will be high yield bonds (commonly referred to as "junk" bonds), which may be considered speculative. The market value of a corporate bond generally may be expected to rise and fall inversely with interest rates. The value of intermediate and longer-term corporate bonds normally fluctuates more in response to changes in interest rates than does the value of shorter-term corporate bonds. The market value of a corporate bond also may be affected by investors' perceptions of the creditworthiness of the issuer, the issuer's performance and perceptions of the issuer in the marketplace.

Leverage Risk. The Fund uses leverage and may utilize leverage to the maximum extent permitted by law. The use of leverage to purchase additional securities creates an opportunity for increased common share dividends, but also creates risks for shareholders, including increased variability of the Fund's net income, distributions and/or net asset value in relation to market changes. Reference Rate Risk. The Fund may invest in financial instruments that recently transitioned from using or continue to use a floating rate based on the London Interbank Offered Rate ("LIBOR"), which is the offered rate for short-term Eurodollar deposits between major International banks. The United Kingdom Financial Conduct Authority ("FCA"), which regulates LIBOR, announced a phase out of LIBOR such that after June 30, 2023, the overnight, 1-month, 3-month, 6-month and 12-month U.S. dollar LIBOR settings ceased to be published or are no longer representative. All other LIBOR settings and certain other interbank offered rates, such as the Euro Overnight Index Average ("EONIA"), ceased to be published after December 31, 2021. On December 16, 2022, the Federal Reserve Board adopted regulations implementing the Adjustable Interest Rate Act by identifying benchmark rates based on the Secured Overnight Financing Rate that replaced LIBOR in different categories of financial contracts after June 30, 2023. These regulations apply only to contracts governed by U.S. law, among other limitations. Neither the effect of the LIBOR transition process nor its ultimate success can yet be known. Not all existing LIBOR-based instruments may have alternative rate-setting provisions and there remains uncertainty regarding the willingness and ability of issuers to add alternative rate-setting provisions in certain existing instruments. Parties to contract, securities or other instruments using LIBOR may disagree on transition rates or the application of applicable transition regulation, potentially resulting in uncertainty of performance and the possibility of litigation. The Fund may have instruments linked to other interbank offered rates that may also cease to be published in the future.

Market Risk. Conditions affecting the general economy, including political, social, or economic instability at the local, regional, or global level may also affect the market value of a security. Health crises, such as pandemic and epidemic diseases, as well as other incidents that interrupt the expected course of events, such as natural disasters, war or civil disturbance, acts of terrorism, power outages and other unforeseeable and external events, and the public response to or fear of such diseases or events, have and may in the future have an adverse effect on the Fund's investments and net asset value and can lead to increased market volatility. Russia launched a large-scale invasion of Ukraine on February 24, 2022, significantly amplifying already existing geopolitical tensions. Actual and threatened responses to such military action may impact the markets for certain commodities and various issuers and may likely have collateral impacts on markets globally. The extent and duration of the military action, resulting sanctions imposed and other punitive action taken and resulting future market disruptions, including declines in European stock markets and the value of Russian sovereign debt, cannot be easily predicted, but could be significant. Any such disruptions caused by Russian military action or other actions (including cyberattacks and espionage) or resulting actual and threatened responses to such activity, including escalating and more widespread military conflict, purchasing and financing restrictions, boycotts or changes in consumer or purchaser preferences, sanctions, tariffs or cyberattacks may impact global economies and the Fund's investments in various markets.

Closed-End Structure. Shares of closed-end investment companies that trade in a secondary market frequently trade at market prices that are lower than their net asset values, known as "trading at a discount." As a result, the Fund is designed primarily for long-term investors.

Although the value of the Fund's net assets is generally considered by market participants in determining whether to purchase or sell shares, whether an investor will realize gains or losses upon the sale of the shares will depend entirely upon whether the market price of the shares at the time of sale is above or below the investor's purchase price for the shares. Because the market price of the shares will be determined by factors such as relative supply of and demand for the shares in the market, general market and economic conditions, and other factors beyond the control of the Fund, the Fund cannot predict whether the shares will trade at, below or above net asset value. Covenant Lite Loan Risk. Some of the loans or debt obligations in which the Fund may invest are "covenant-lite", which means the loans or obligations contain fewer financial maintenance covenants than other loans or obligations and do not include terms which allow the lender to monitor the borrower's performance and declare a default if certain criteria are breached. An investment by the Fund in a covenant-lite loan may potentially hinder the ability to reprice credit risk associated with the issuer and reduce the ability to restructure a problematic loan and mitigate potential loss.

DEFINITIONS

Assets Under Management ("AUM") - The assets of the funds, partnerships and accounts to which Apollo provides investment management, advisory, or certain other investment-related services, including, without limitation, capital that such funds, partnerships and accounts have the right to call from investors pursuant to capital commitments. 2. The fair value of the investments of the equity and certain hybrid funds, partnerships and accounts Apollo manages or advises, plus the capital that such funds, partnerships and accounts are entitled to call from investors pursuant to capital commitments, plus portfolio level financings;
3. The gross asset value associated with the reinsurance investments of the portfolio company assets Apollo manages or advises; and
4. The fair value of any other assets that Apollo manages or advises for the funds, partnerships and accounts to which Apollo provides investment management, advisory, or certain other investment-related services, plus unused credit facilities, including capital commitments to such funds, partnerships and accounts for investments that may require pre-qualification or other conditions before investment plus any other capital commitments to such funds, partnerships and accounts available for investment that are not otherwise included in the clauses above.

Apollo's AUM measure includes Assets Under Management for which Apollo charges either nominal or zero fees. Apollo's AUM measure also includes assets for which Apollo does not have investment discretion, including certain assets for which Apollo earns only investment-related service fees, rather than management or advisory fees. Apollo's definition of AUM is not based on any definition of Assets Under Management contained in its governing documents or in any management agreements of the funds Apollo manages. Apollo considers multiple factors for determining what should be included in its definition of AUM. Such factors include but are not limited to (1) Apollo's ability to influence the investment decisions for existing and available assets; (2) Apollo's ability to generate income from the underlying assets in the funds it manages; and (3) the AUM measures that Apollo uses internally or believes are used by other investment managers. Given the differences in the investment strategies and structures among other alternative investment managers, Apollo's calculation of AUM may differ from the calculations employed by other investment managers and, as a result, this measure may not be directly comparable to similar measures presented by other investment managers. Apollo's calculation also differs from the manner in which its affiliates registered with the SEC report "Regulatory Assets Under Management" on Form ADV and Form PF in various ways.

Apollo uses AUM, Gross capital deployment and dry powder as performance measurements of its investment activities, as well as to monitor fund size in relation to professional resource and infrastructure needs.
